Welcome to the Spark Newsletter. The second half of this term has been busy to say the least.




Year 1 Heavenly Sent

Year 3 **fong live the king!**




Last year with year 3/current year 4 we sent a letter to the King to congratulate him on his coronation, and we heard back!





Once again this year, we are working with the ACE Partnership, run by Mr Hoad and Dan and we're competing against Rudyard Kipling, Saltdean and Woodingdean Primary Schools this year. We started back in September with our Longball festivals for KS2, which was a brilliant opportunity for the children to meet lots of new people, try a new sport and have lots of fun.
